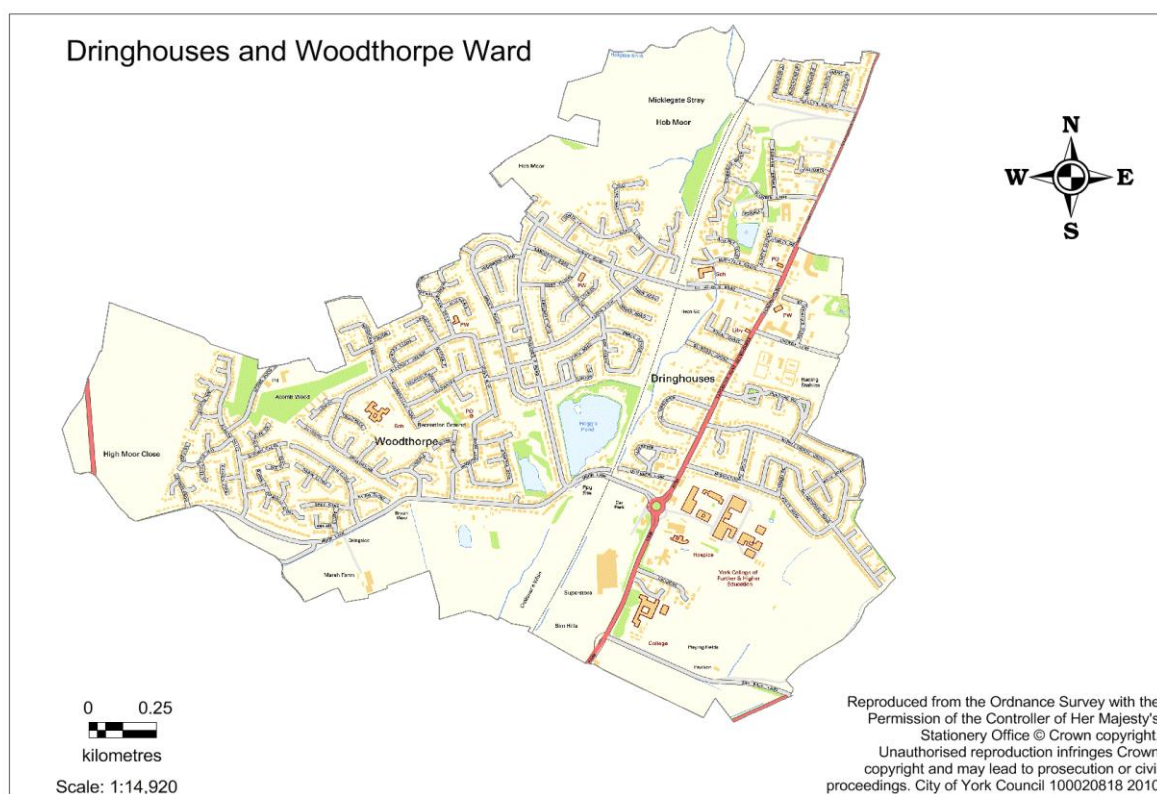


York Summary

- York has 209,301 residents with 7.3% from a black and minority ethnic community group. 83.6% are in good health, with 17.1% stating that they have some limitation in day to day activities.
- £794.78 was the Average Net Weekly Household Income in 2022/23 (£656.05 in 2019/20).
- 65% own their own home, either outright or with a mortgage, 20% are private renters and 14% are social tenants. There are 7,293 Council Houses in York.
- 79.3% of residents have a Level 1 - 4 qualification, of which 71.9% are, at least, qualified to Level 2, but 13.3% have no qualifications at all.
- 15.8% of children are living in low income families and there are 12.3% of households in fuel poverty.
- 11.3% of the working age population (15,239 people aged 16-64) claim Universal Credit, of which 62.6% are not in employment.



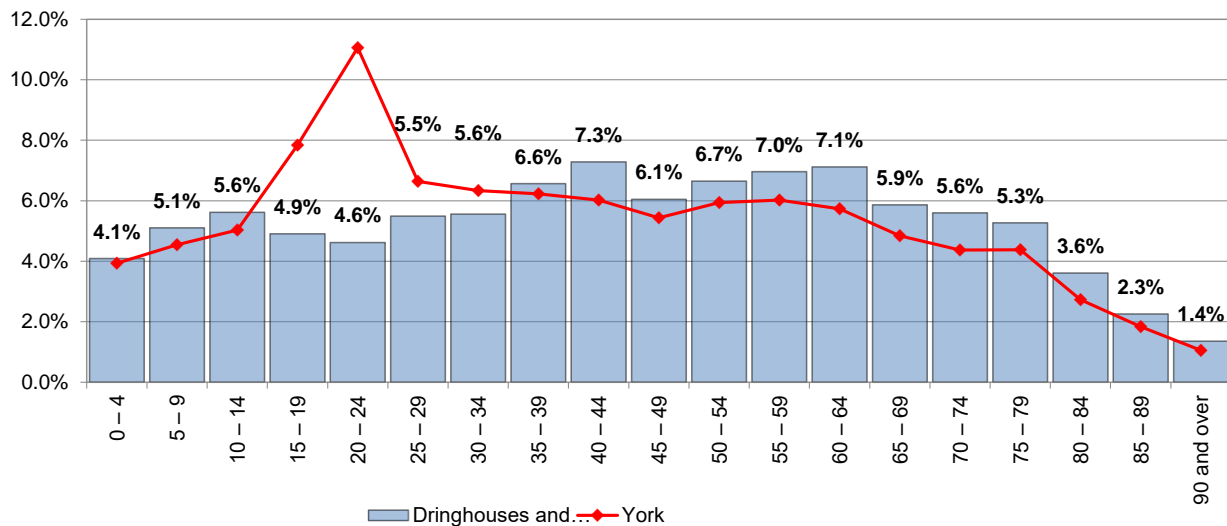
Ward Summary

- Dringhouses and Woodthorpe has 11,617 residents with 4.0% from a black and minority ethnic community group. 84.0% are in good health, with 15.7% stating that they have some limitation in day to day activities.
- £766.11 was the Average Net Weekly Household Income in 2022/23 (£619.87 in 2019/20).
- 77% own their own home, either outright or with a mortgage, 11% are private renters and 10% are social tenants. There are 373 Council Houses in this ward, which is 5.10% of York's total.
- 78.3% of residents have a Level 1 - 4 qualification, of which 69.9% are, at least, qualified to Level 2, but 14.1% have no qualifications at all.
- 11.8% of children are living in low income families and there are 10.0% of households in fuel poverty.
- 9.9% of the working age population (674 people aged 16-64) claim Universal Credit, of which 5.7% are not in employment.

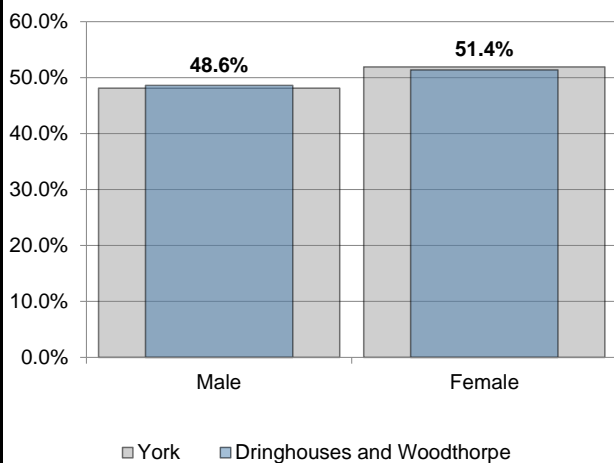
Population by Age

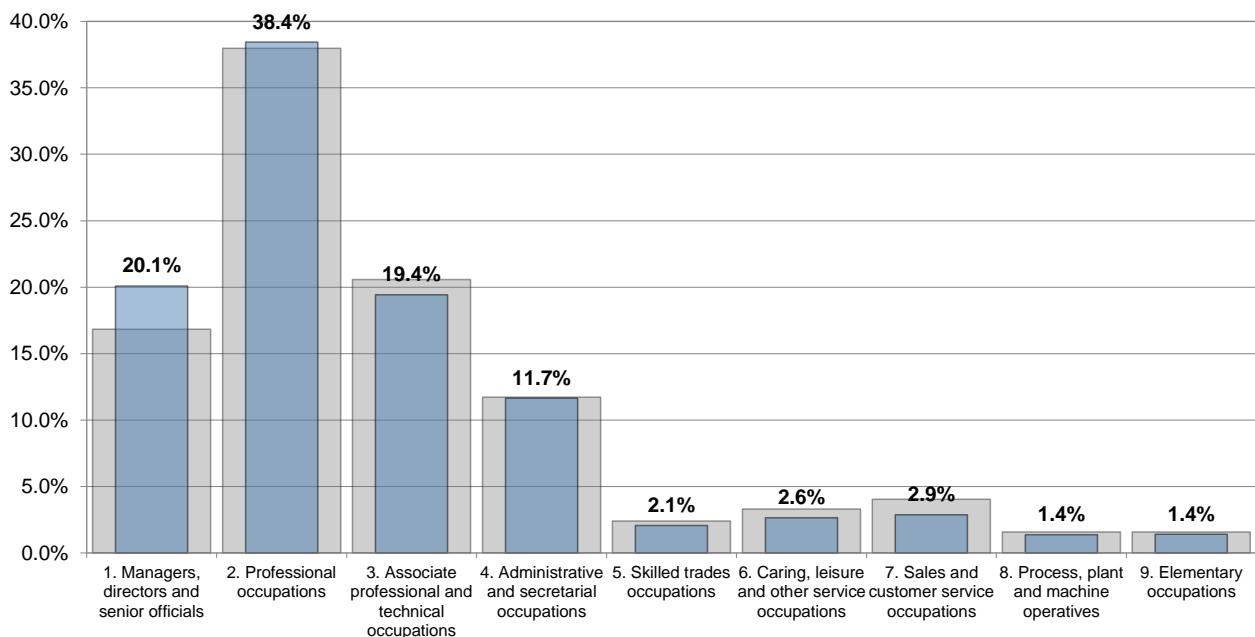

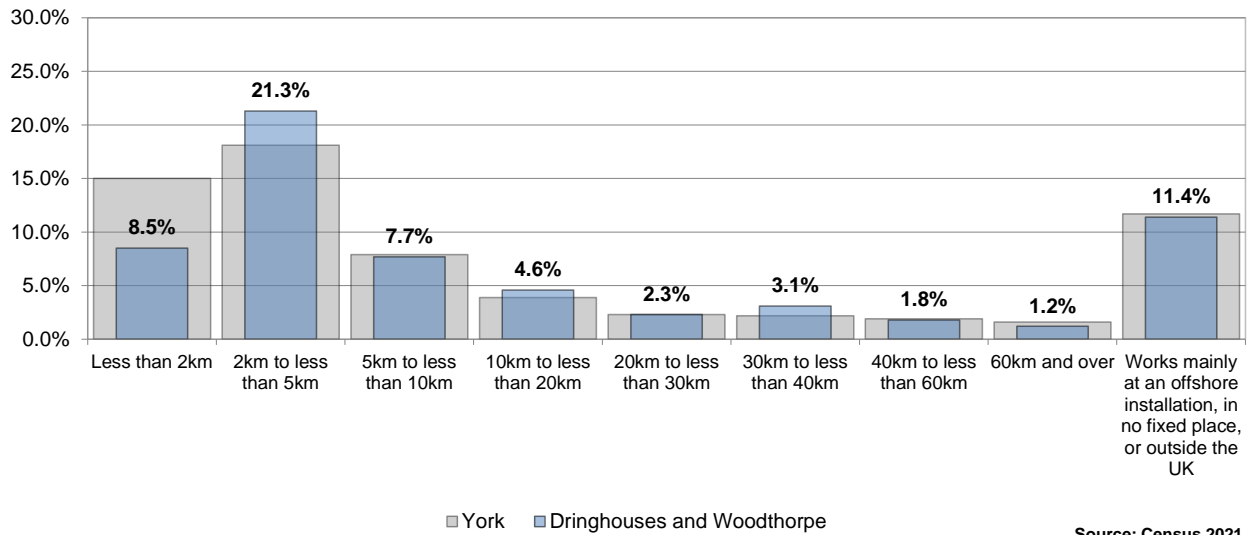

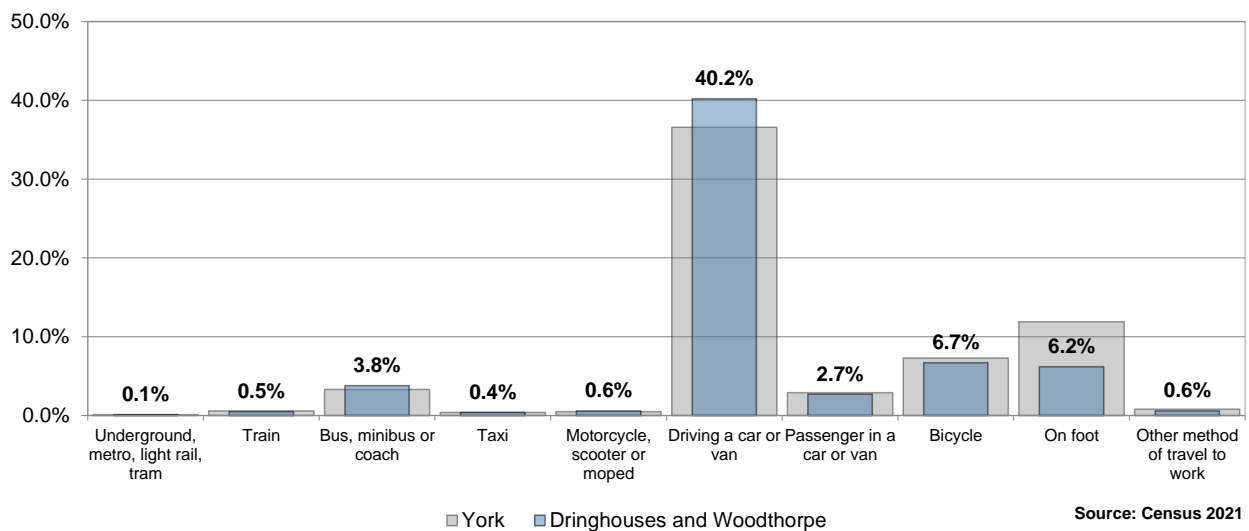

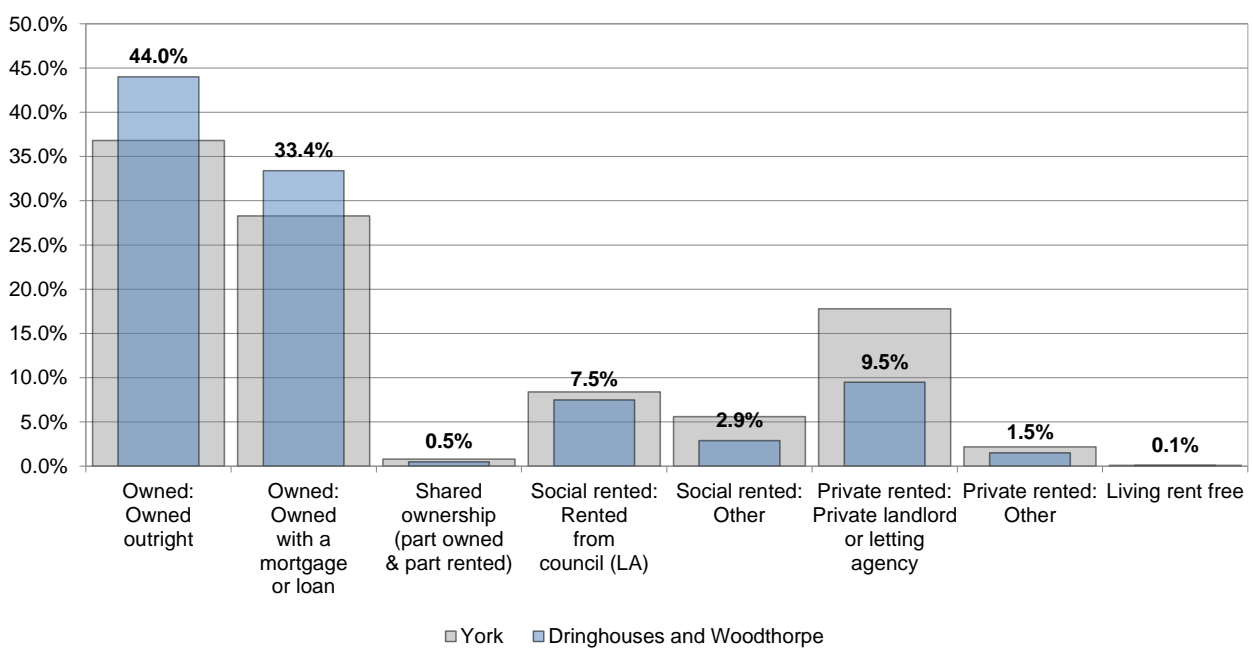

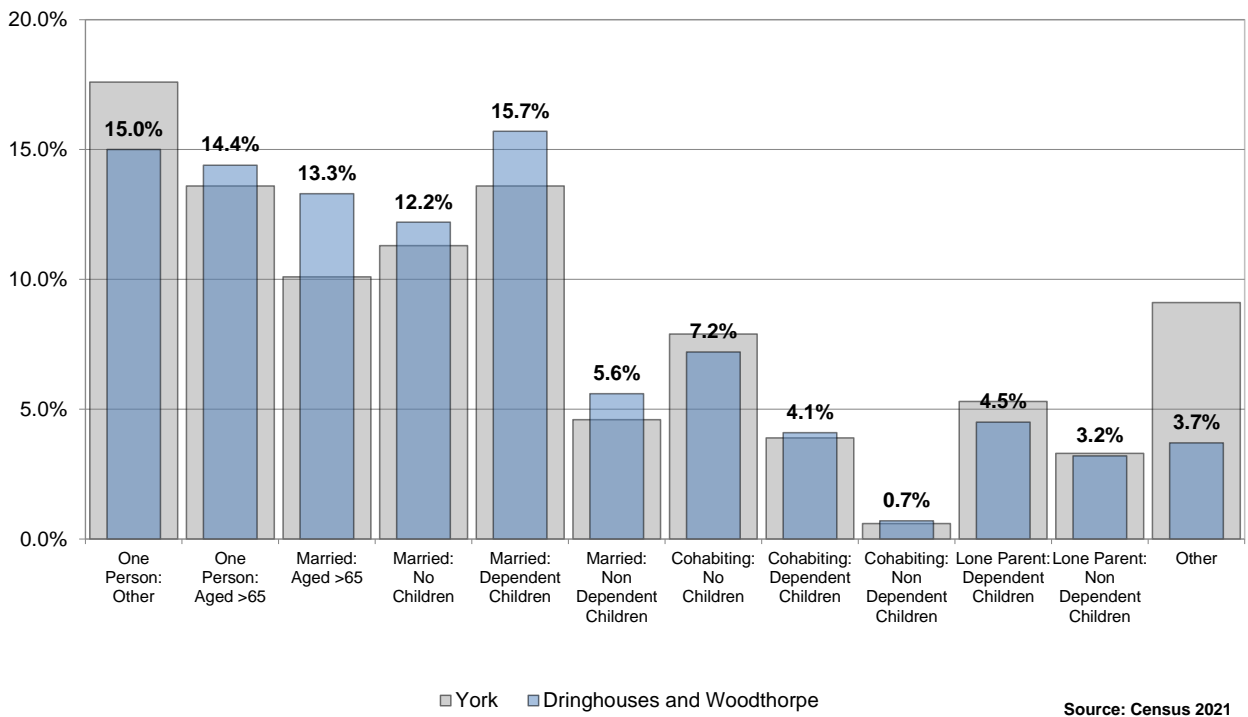
Method used to travel to work

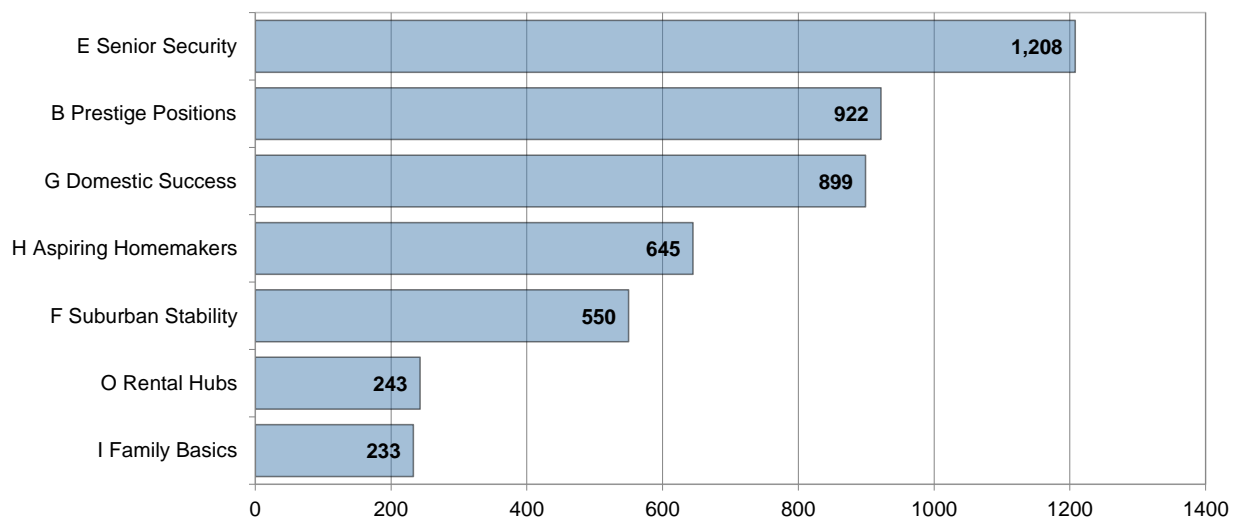

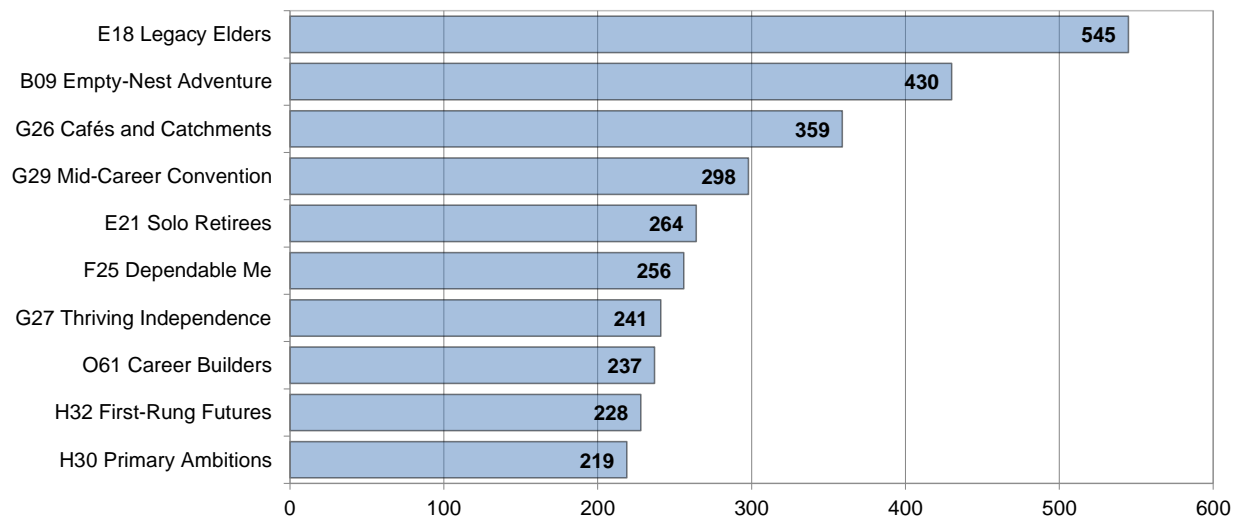

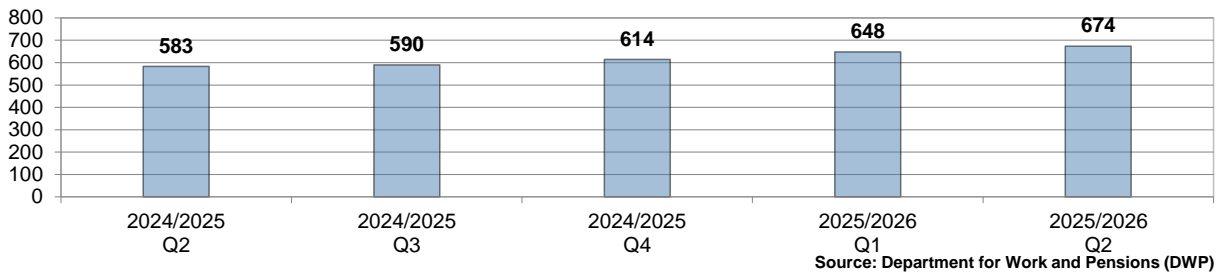
Benefit Claimants

The Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) plans to move all legacy benefit claimants to Universal Credit by March 2026, completing the rollout and closing all legacy benefits by this date.

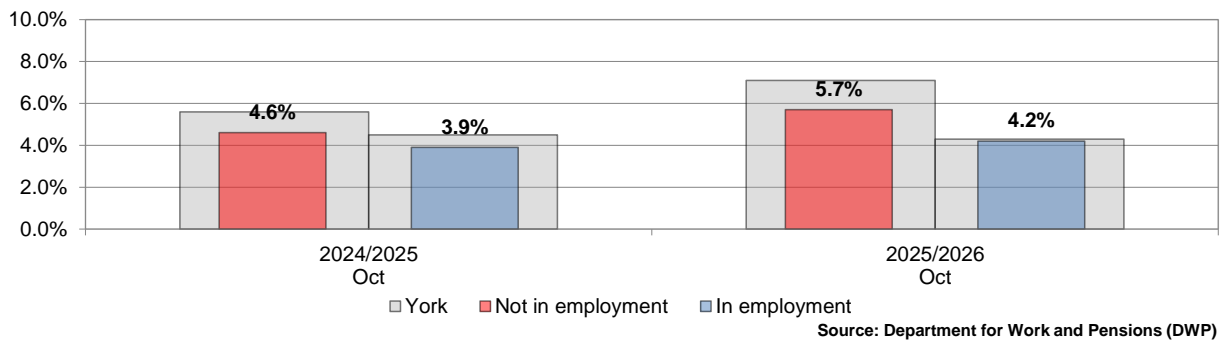
Legacy benefits include Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance (JSA), Income-related Employment and Support Allowance (ESA), Income Support, Housing Benefit, Child Tax Credit, and Working Tax Credit.

- The DWP has reported that all claimants of Income Support, income-based Jobseeker's Allowance (JSA), Housing Benefit and Tax Credits have already moved to Universal Credit.
- The DWP has reported that all claimants of income-related Employment and Support Allowance (ESA) only, or income-related ESA and Housing Benefit will have moved to Universal Credit by March 2026.

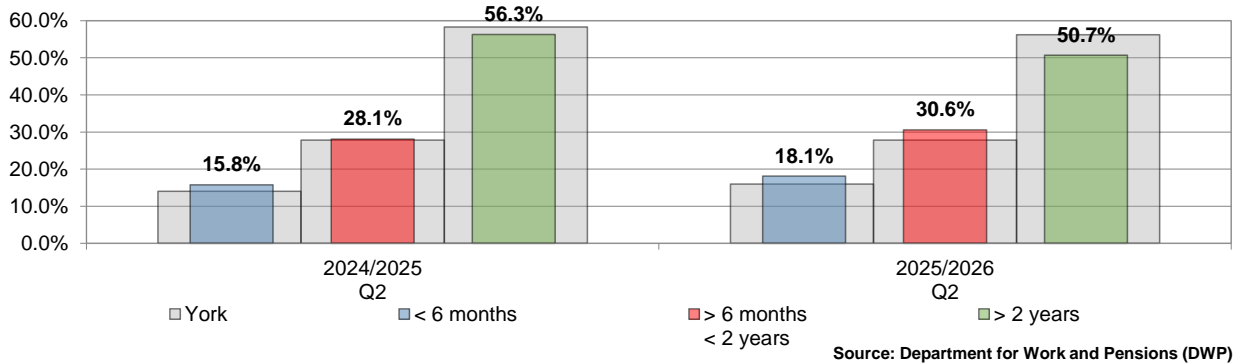
Universal Credit claimants - In Dringhouses and Woodthorpe there are 674 claimants as at 2025/2026 Q2 (an increase from 583 in Q2 2024/2025). This is 9.9% of the working age population.



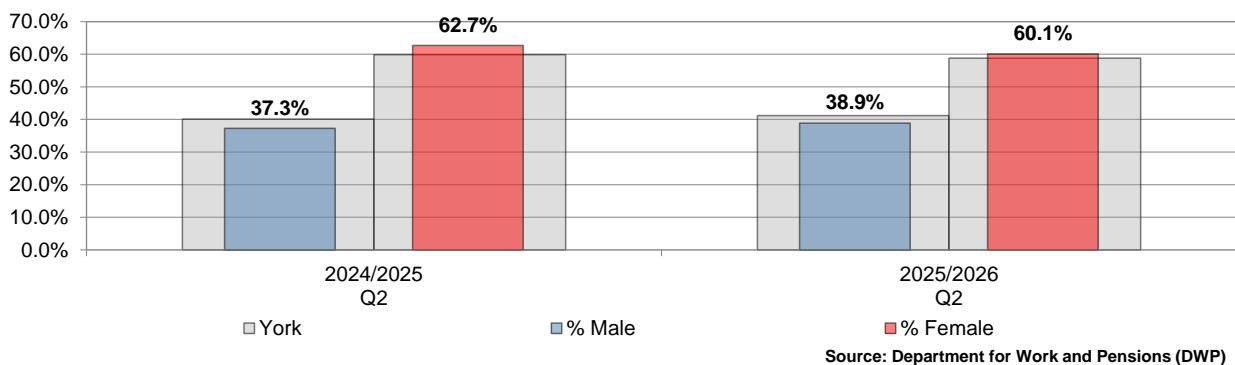
Universal Credit claimants - Type and proportion of working age population (16-64)



Universal Credit claimants - Duration on Universal Credit

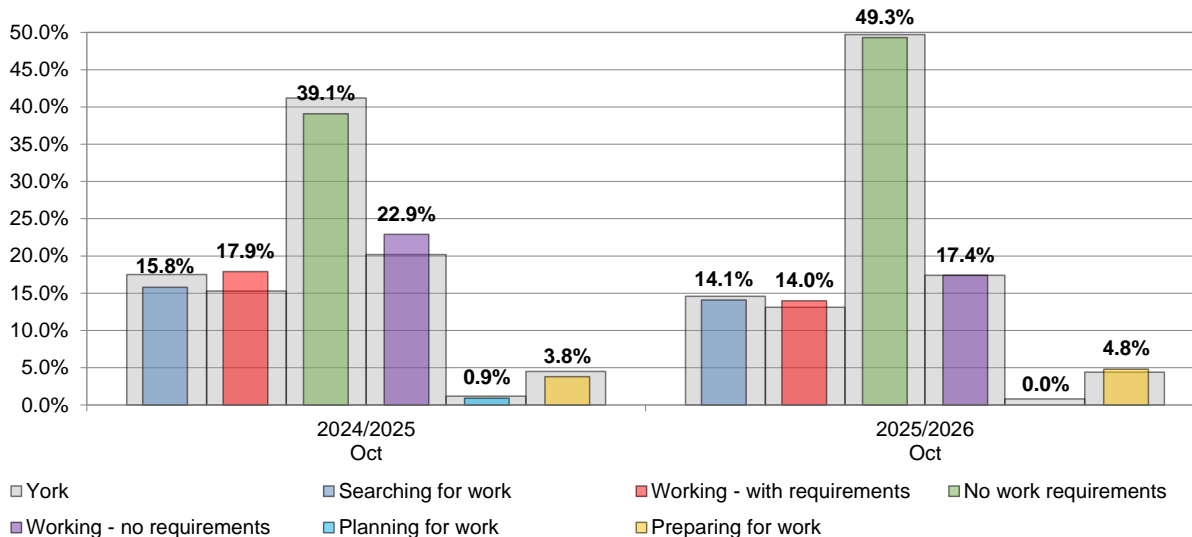


Universal Credit claimants - By Gender

Universal Credit - Conditionality Regime



Conditionality means work-related activities a claimant will have to do in order to get full entitlement to Universal Credit. Each person will be assigned one of six conditionality regimes (below) based on their assessed capability and circumstances.

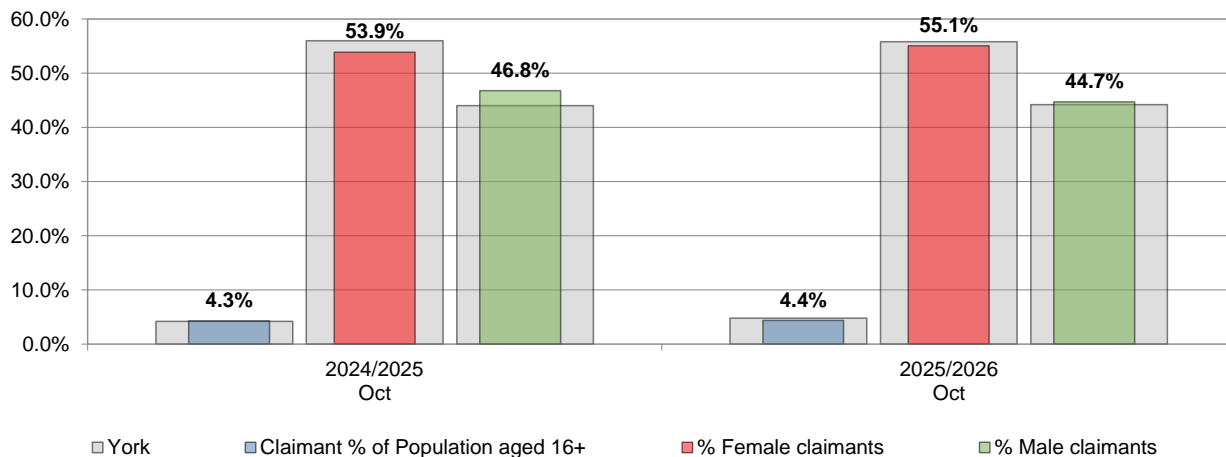
As circumstances change claimants will also transition between conditionality regimes.

Conditionality Regime	Description
Searching for work	Claimant is required to take action to secure work - or more / better paid work. The Work Coach supports them to plan their work search and preparation activity.
Working - with requirements	In work but could earn more, or not working but has a partner with low earnings
No work requirements	Not expected to work at present. Health or caring responsibility prevents claimant from working or preparing for work.
Working - no requirements	Required to inform DWP of changes of circumstances, particularly if at risk of decreasing earnings or losing job.
Planning for work	Claimant required to attend periodic interviews to plan for their return to work.
Preparing for work	The claimant is expected to take reasonable steps to prepare for work including Work Focused Interview.

(generally for individuals aged 16+ who have a long-term illness, health condition, or disability that makes it difficult to carry out everyday tasks or get around)



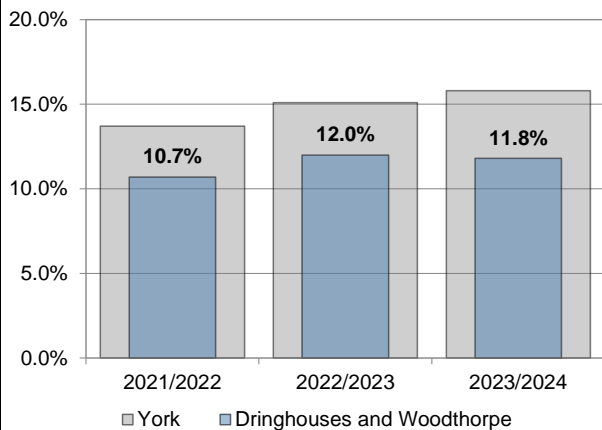

The proportion of children (under 16) who are living in families whose reported income is less than 60 per cent of UK median income

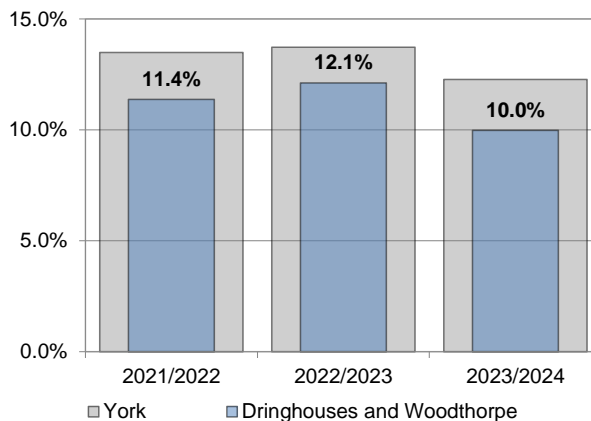

Fuel Poverty

- they are living in a property with a fuel poverty energy efficiency rating of band D or below; and
- when they spend the required amount to heat their home, they are left with a residual income below the official poverty

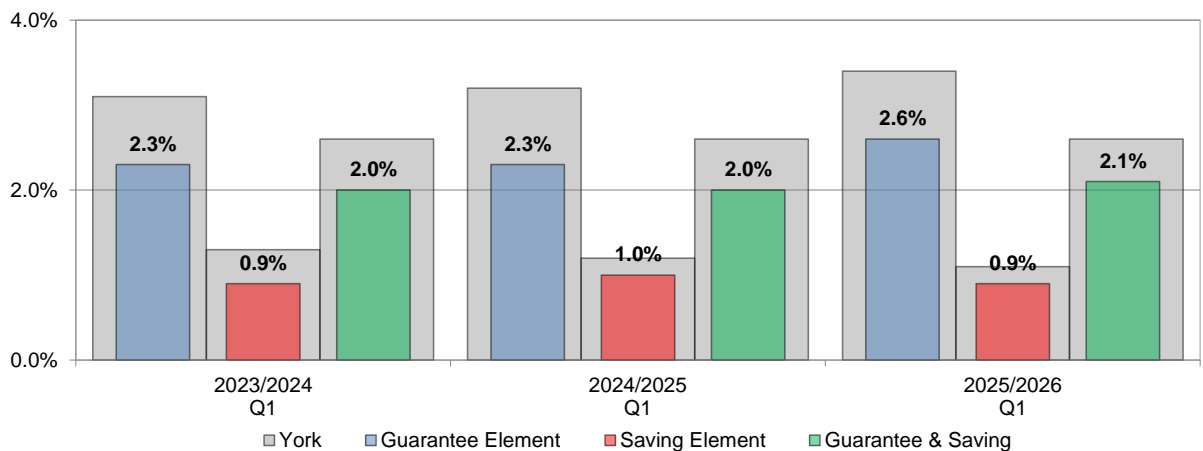

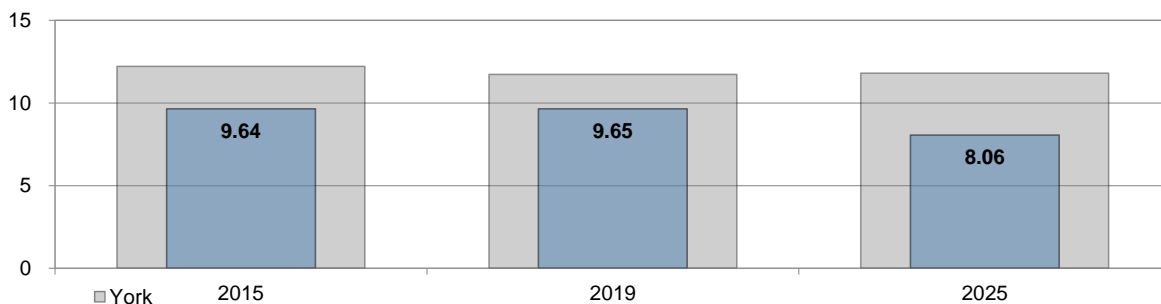
It's separate from the State Pension and can also open the door to other benefits and support.

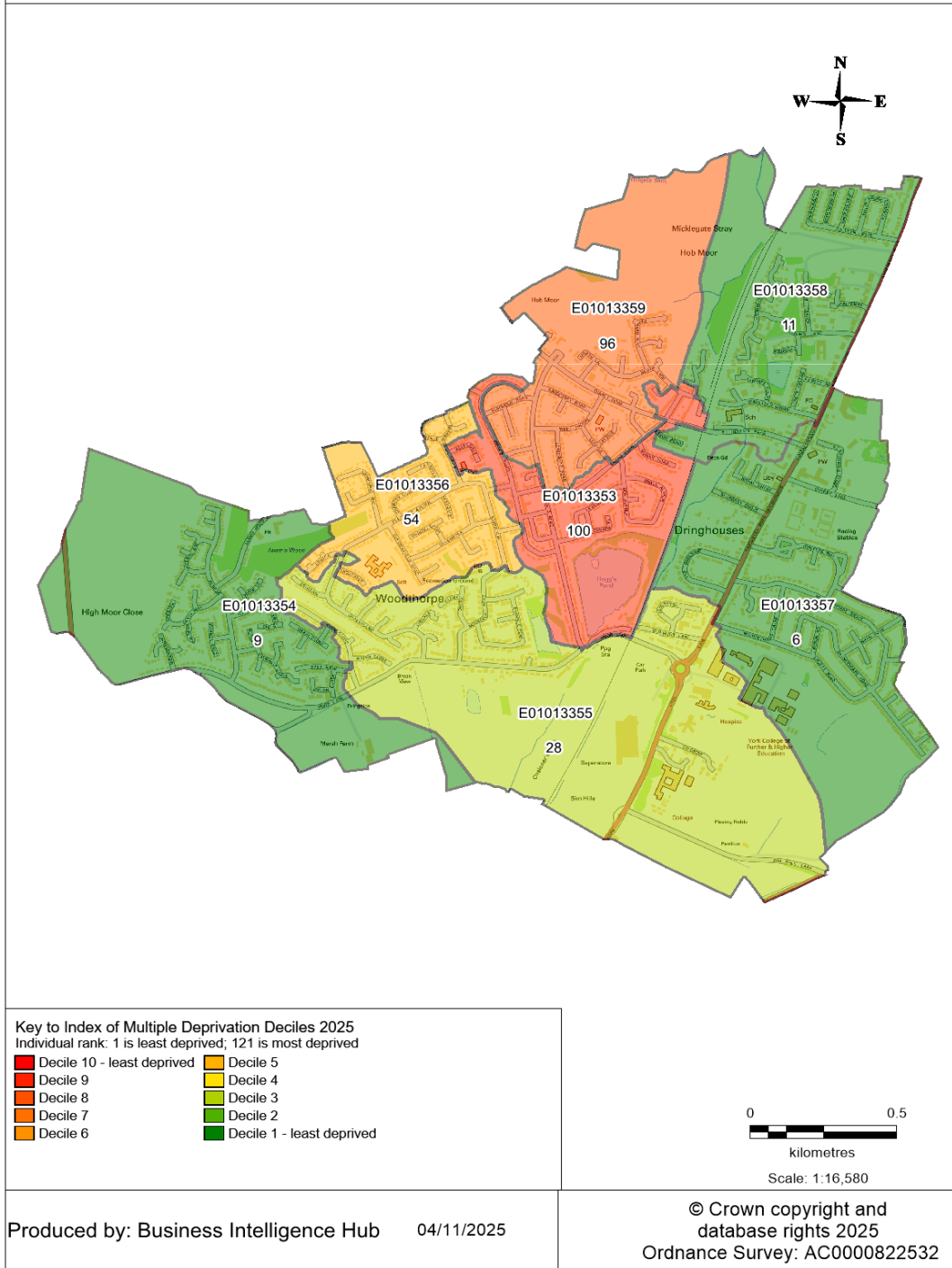

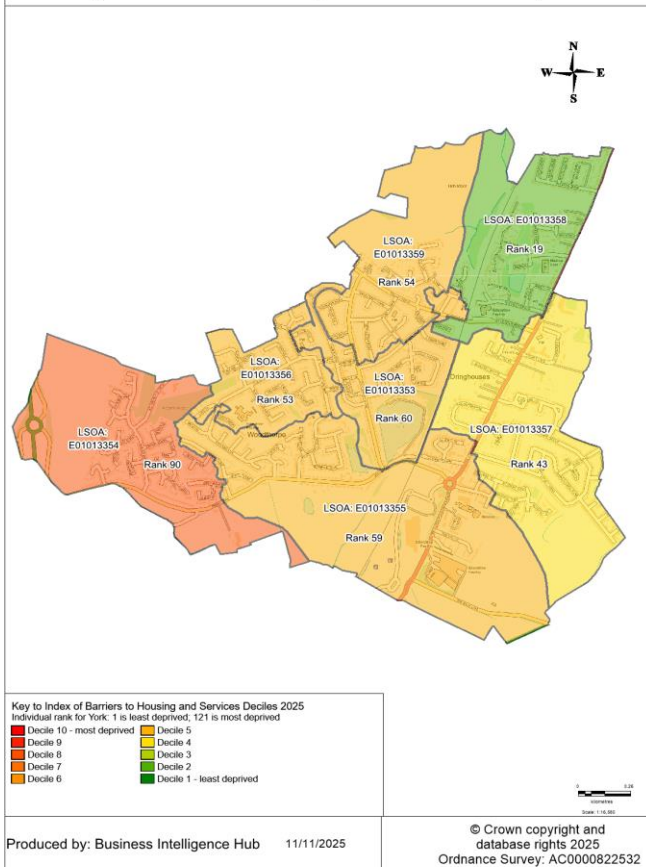

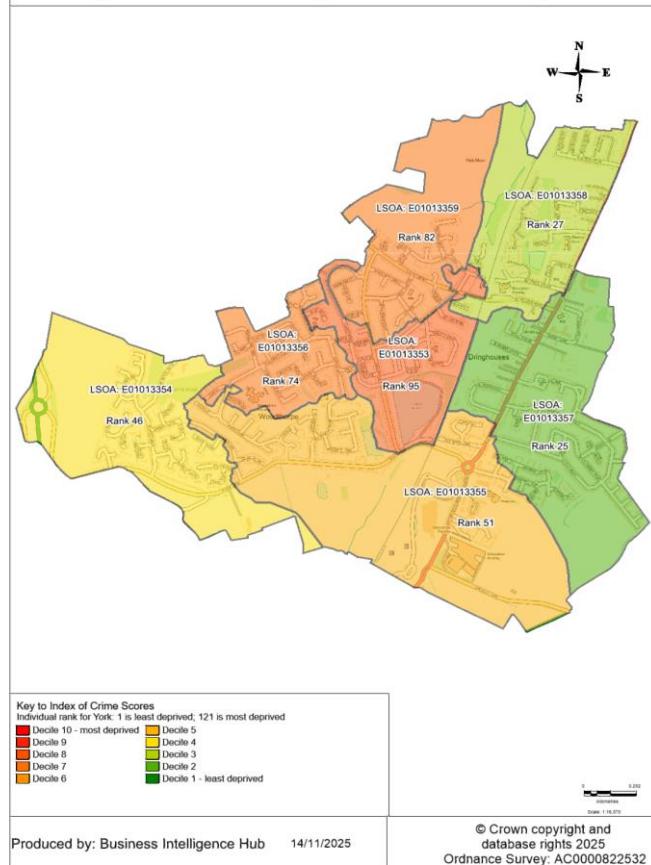
Index of Multiple Deprivation 2025 Dringhouses and Woodthorpe Ward: breakdown by LSOA



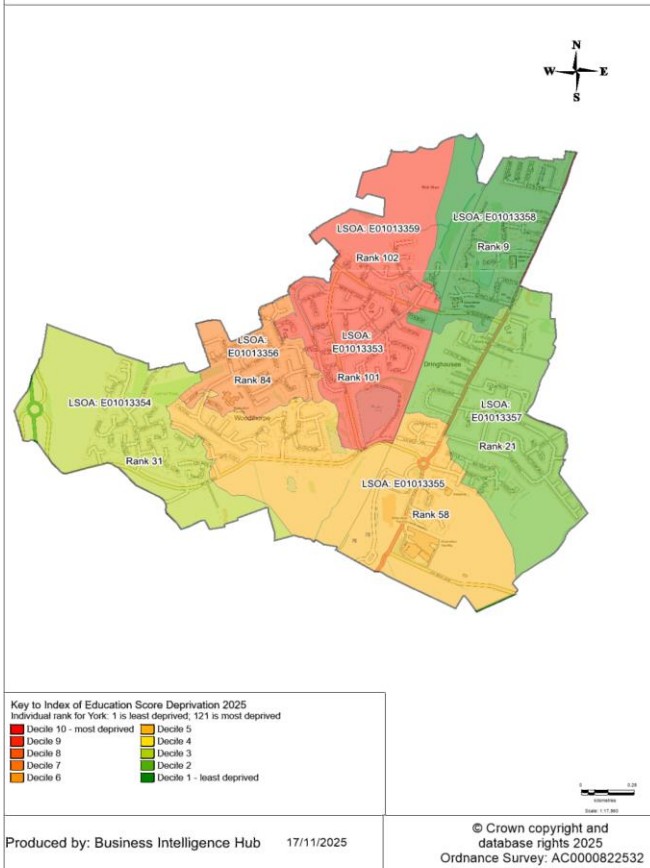
Index of Barriers to Housing and Services Deprivation 2025 Dringhouses and Woodthorpe Ward: breakdown by LSOA



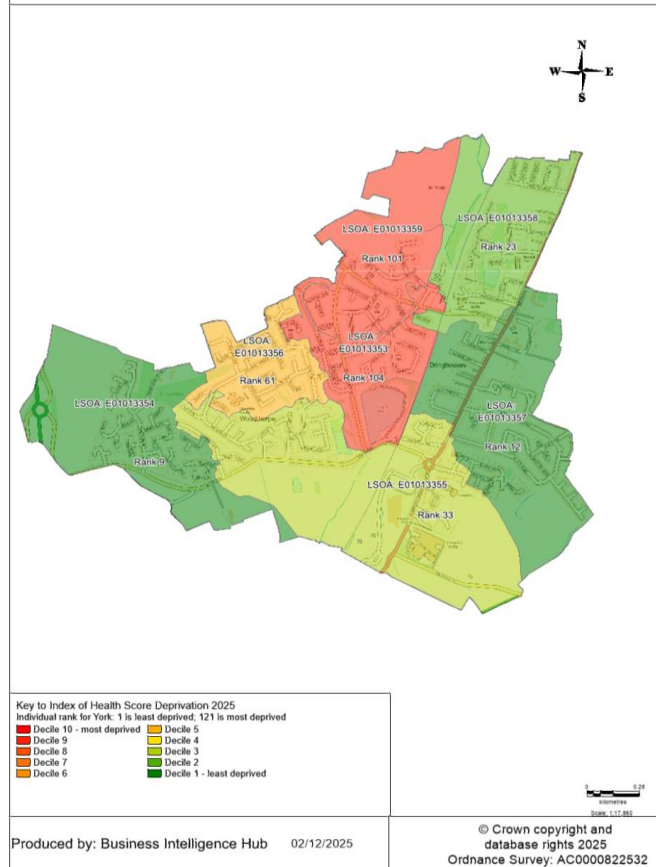
Index of Crime Score Deprivation 2025 Dringhouses and Woodthorpe Ward: breakdown by LSOA



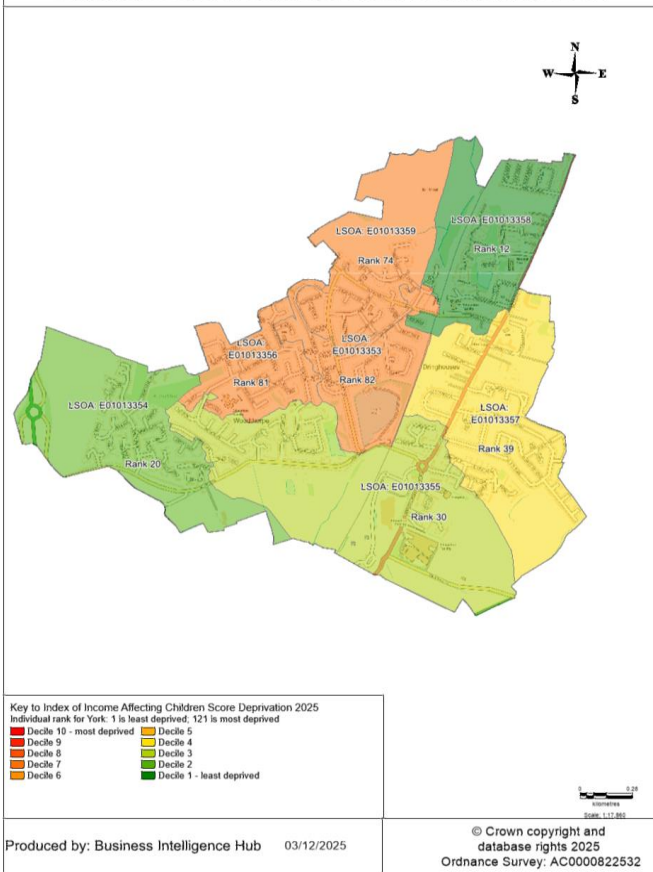
Index of Education, Skills and Training Score Deprivation 2025 Dringhouses and Woodthorpe Ward: breakdown by LSOA



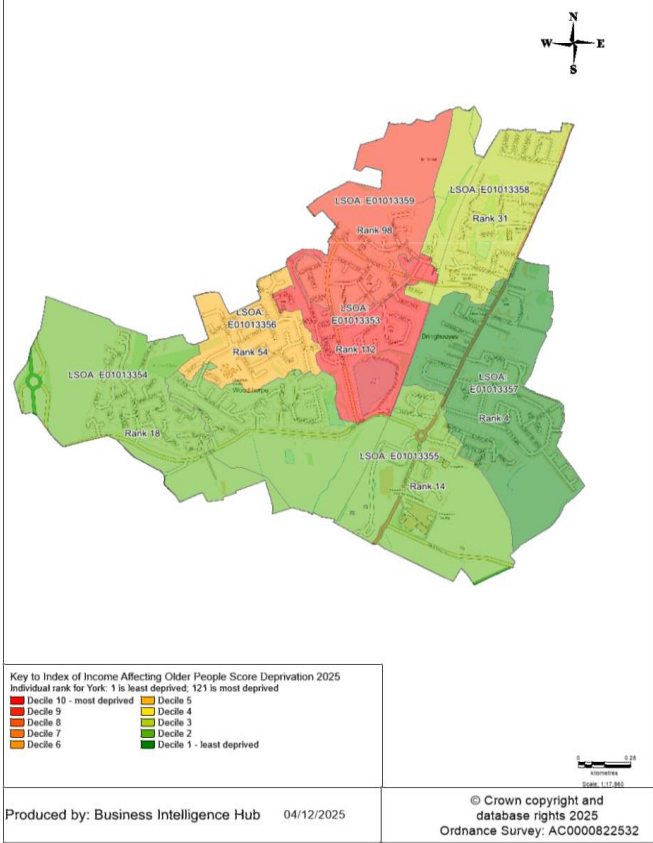
Index of Health Score Deprivation 2025 Dringhouses and Woodthorpe Ward: breakdown by LSOA



Index of Income Affecting Children Score Deprivation (IDACI) 2025 Dringhouses and Woodthorpe Ward: breakdown by LSOA

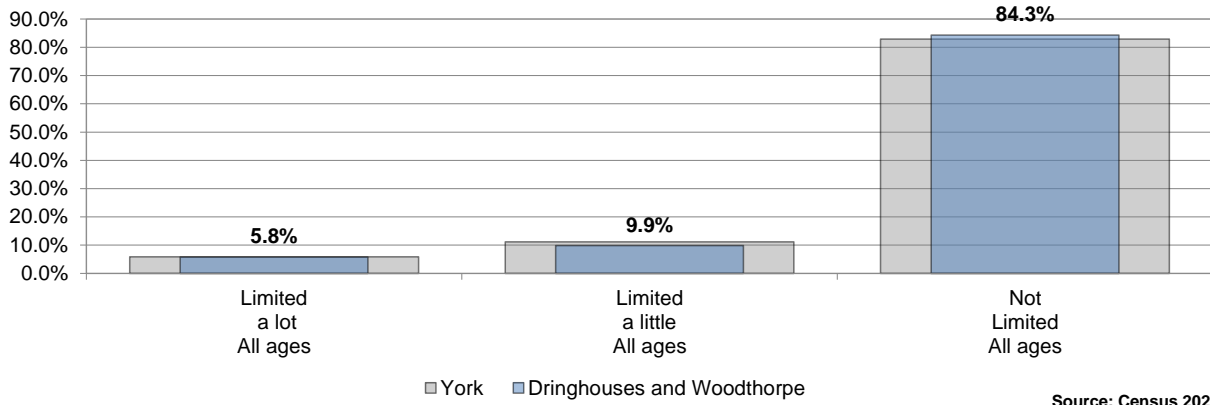


Index of Income Affecting Older People Score Deprivation (IDOP) 2025 Dringhouses and Woodthorpe Ward: breakdown by LSOA



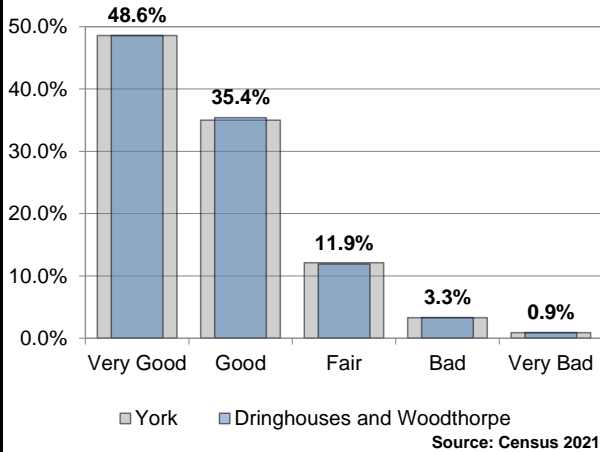

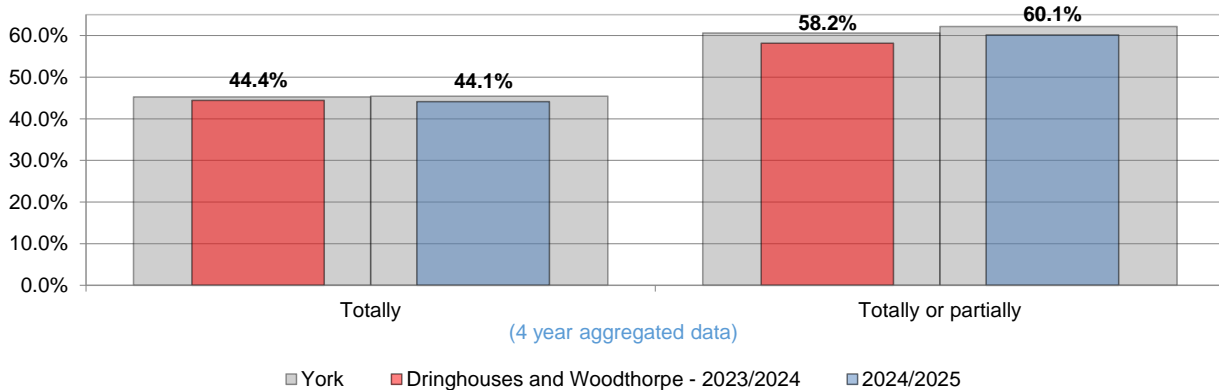

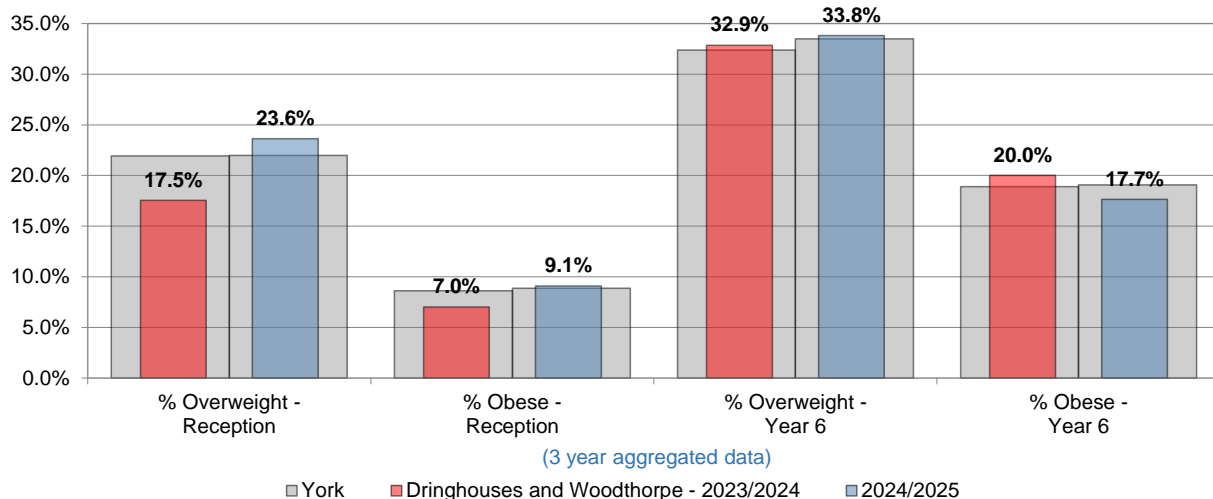
Percentage of children breastfeeding at 6-8 weeks

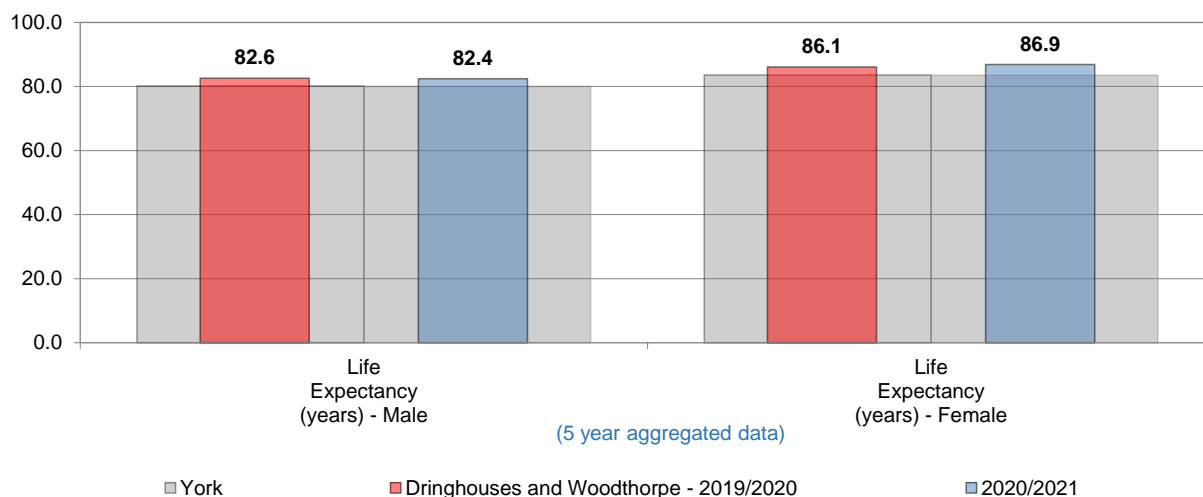

Life Expectancy

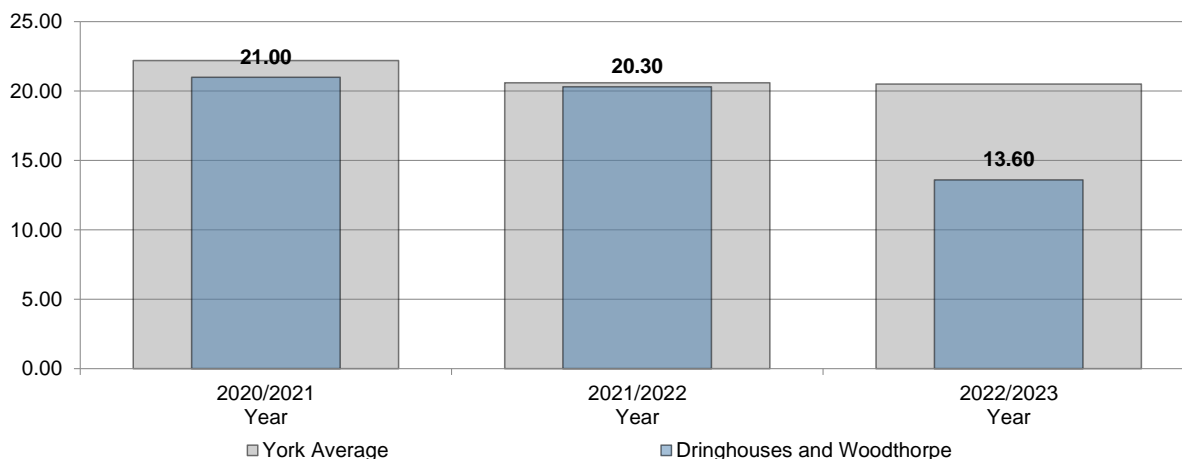

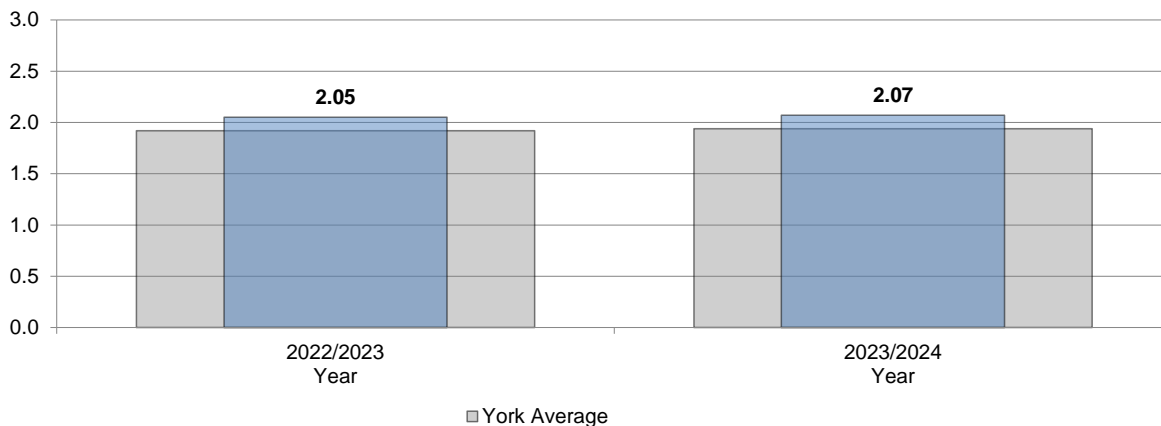
Social isolation

A score of 1 indicates that the respondent has plenty of social contact and that they spend their time doing things they enjoy

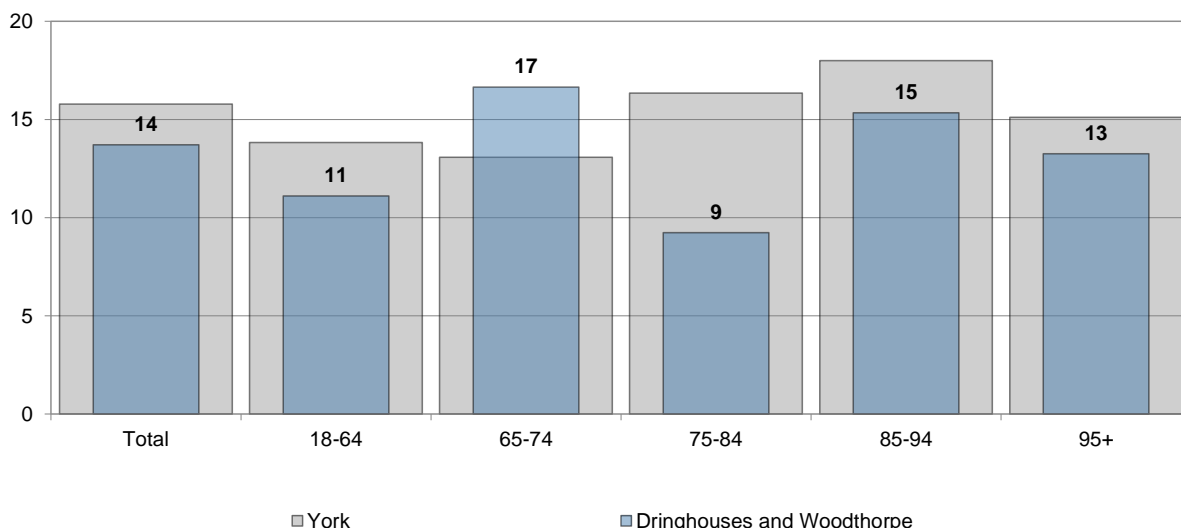
A score of 4 indicates that the respondent feels socially isolated and that they don't feel they do anything of value with their time.

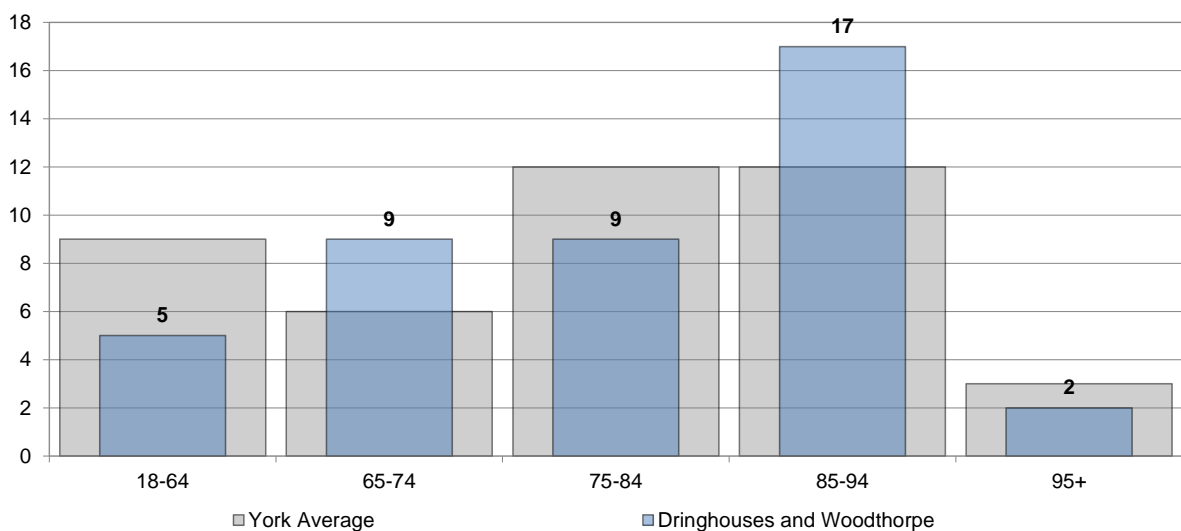

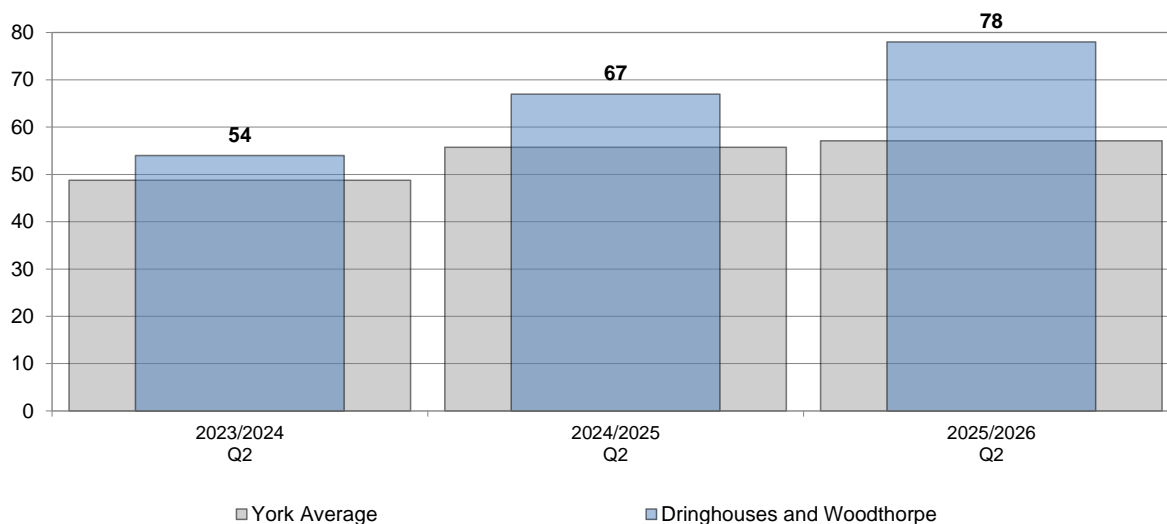

Number of clients getting paid packages of care that are not residential/nursing care



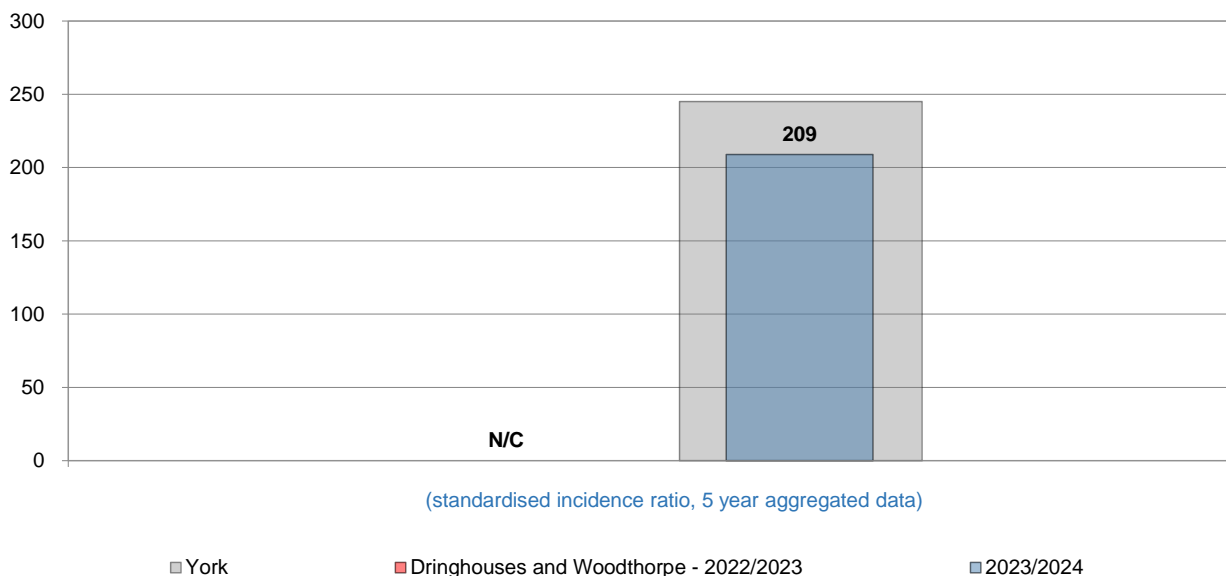

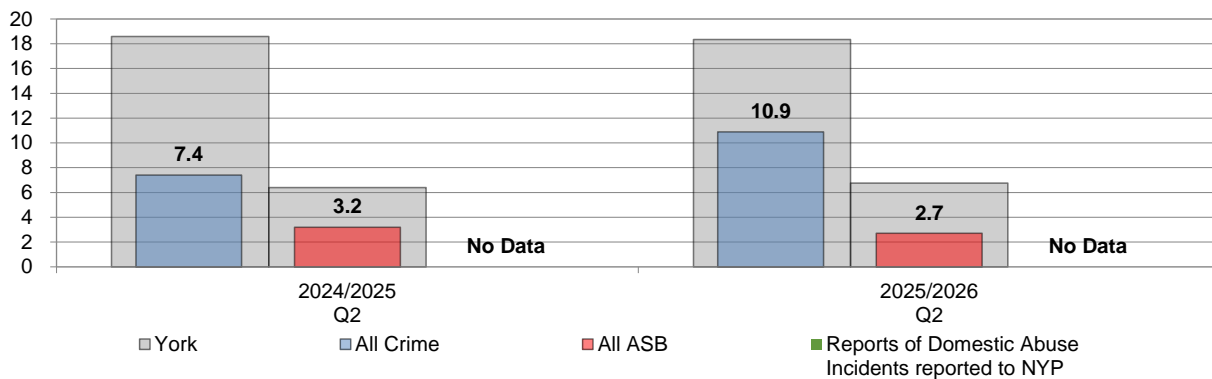

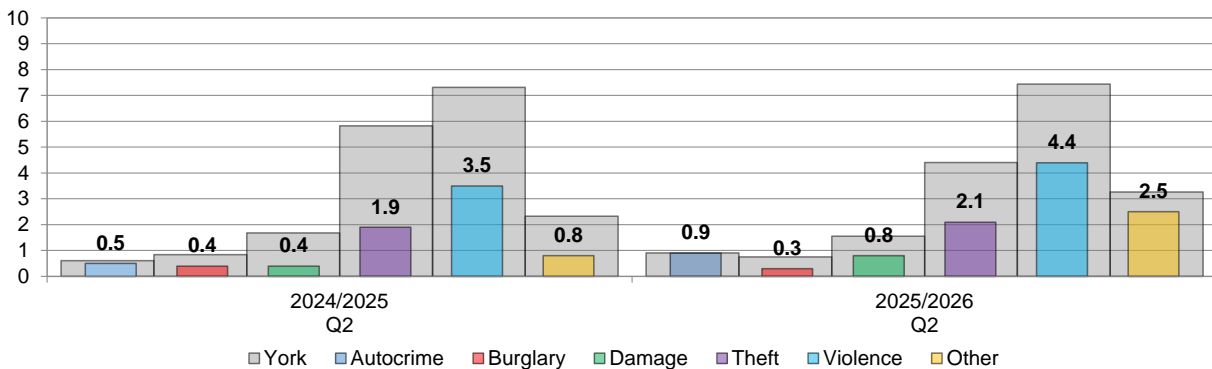

Total Crime, Total Anti-Social Behaviour and Domestic violence incidents reported to the police per 1,000 population



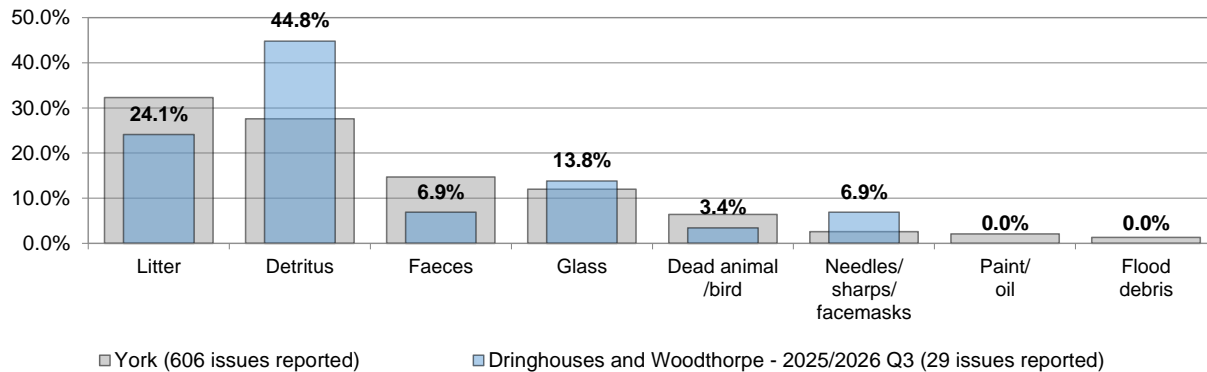

Crime Rate per 1,000 population



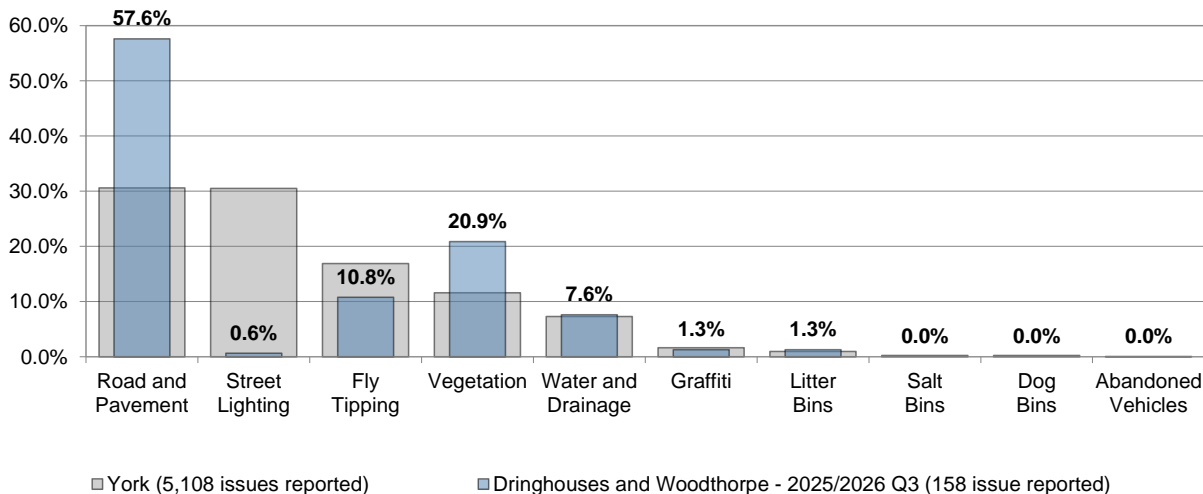

Road Condition Survey 2024-2025

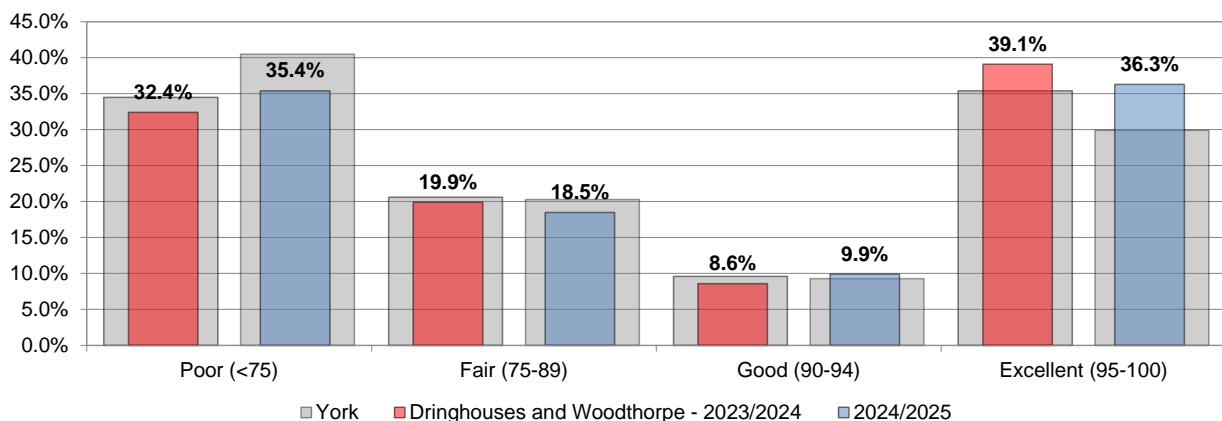
The data published within this resource represents an ongoing dataset of automated surface condition surveys which are carried out by the City of York Council (CoYC) in order to provide an element of the information required to prioritise schemes and help to extend the life of the UK's public infrastructure assets.

The data shown here is for road condition surveys captured within a financial year i.e. 2024/25 is for surveys between 1st April 2024 and 31st March 2025. The data published is used within wider analysis carried out by the Highways department, to help prioritise schemes to ensure more effective maintenance of highways, as well as to monitor and improve on previous maintenance techniques.

This data is provided within a spreadsheet, but can also be viewed as a map base on the Council Yorkview platform. A simple explanation of the methodology is that each section of road that has been able to be surveyed is given a score out of 100 and the mean score is for each street is calculated out of those road section scores. Roads may have been surveyed multiple times over the course of the year.

The road condition scores are then split into four general categories:

- Excellent (95-100)
- Good (90-94)
- Fair (75-89)
- Poor (<75)



The data contains records which appear to be duplicated in this dataset, where a street has two road condition scores in the same ward. This is because a street can have multiple USRNs (unique street reference number) which is used to calculate the street road condition score, however City of York Council can't publish the USRN alongside this data giving the appearance of duplicated records. Each section of road is assigned a ward based on which ward the middle of the road segment is in, so there will also be multiple scores for roads if the road crosses over a ward boundary. This can be seen on YorkView.

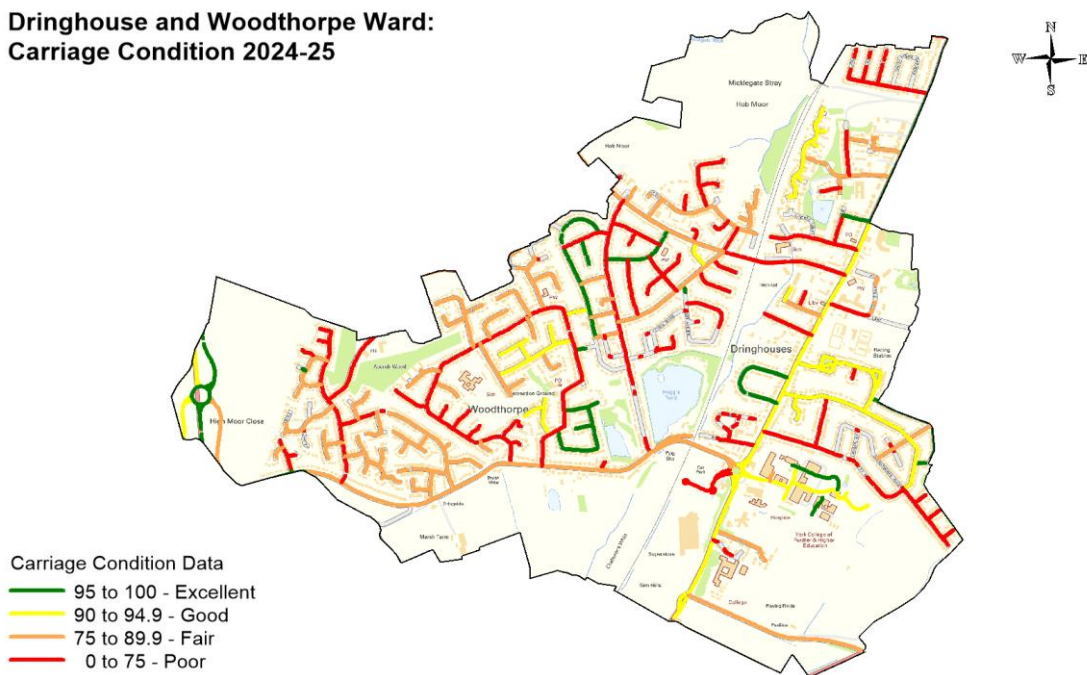
It should be noted that condition data is collected covering the full CoYC road network with a condition score produced for every 10m length of carriageway surveyed. The process of averaging the data to align with the USRN does distort the Yorkview output meaning that the red/poor condition band is over represented. The Yorkview data does provide a good coarse visual guide to the condition of any particular street although the original 10m data is used for all analysis within our Asset Management Systems.

Previous road condition data pre-March 2022 has been taken down as the supplier for the road condition data for 2022/23 and 2023/24 uses a different methodology to previous road condition data published 2016-2021.

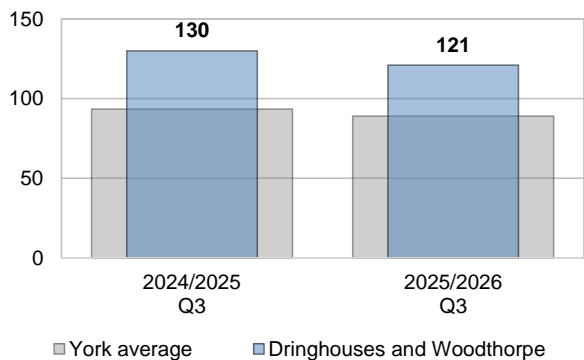

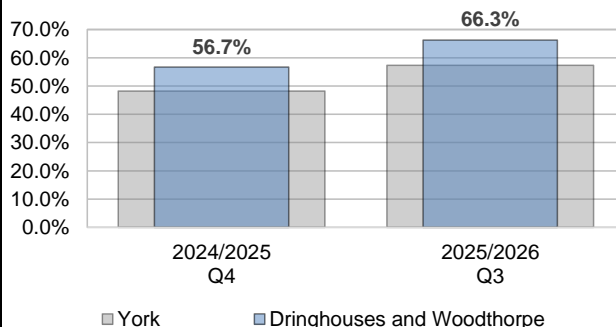
Waste collections

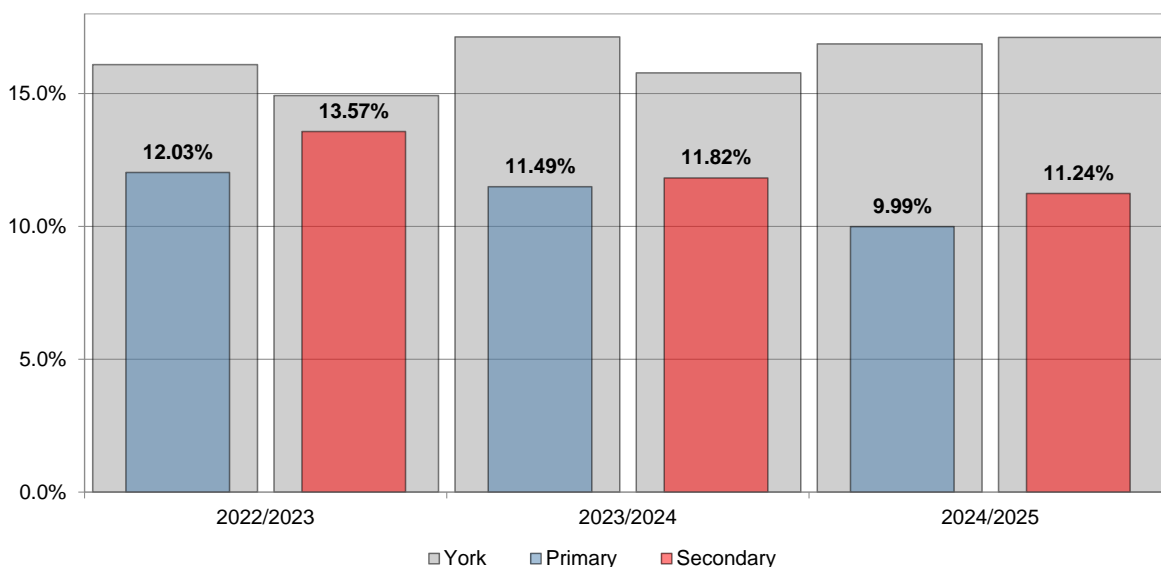

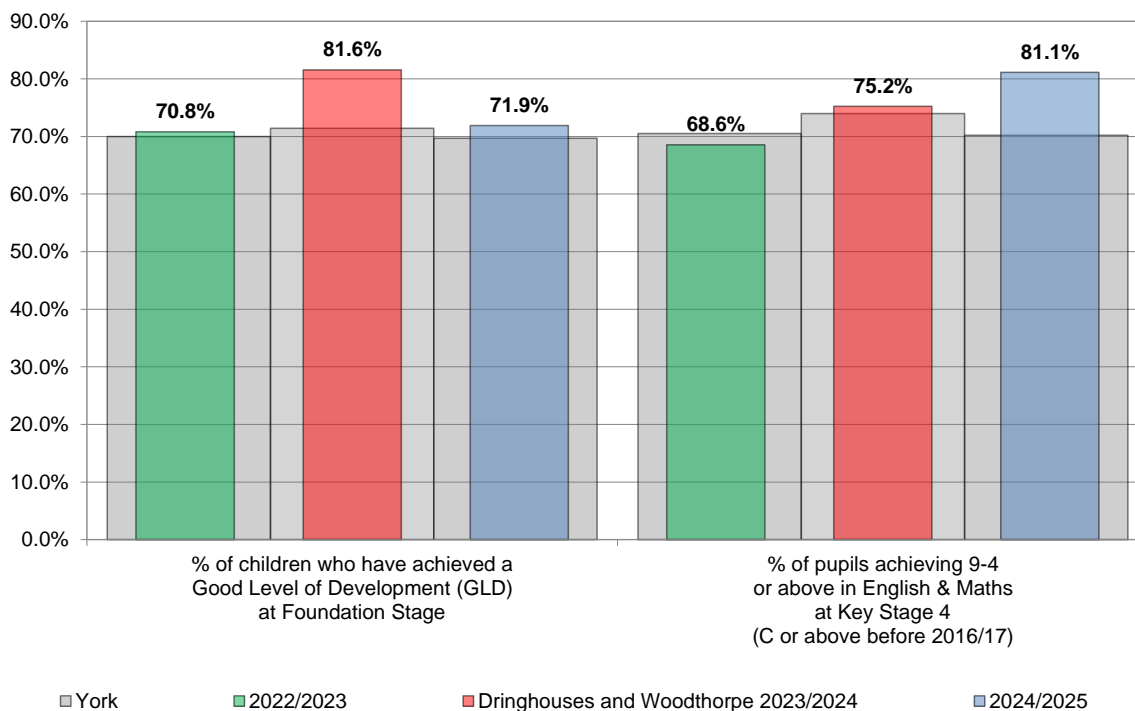

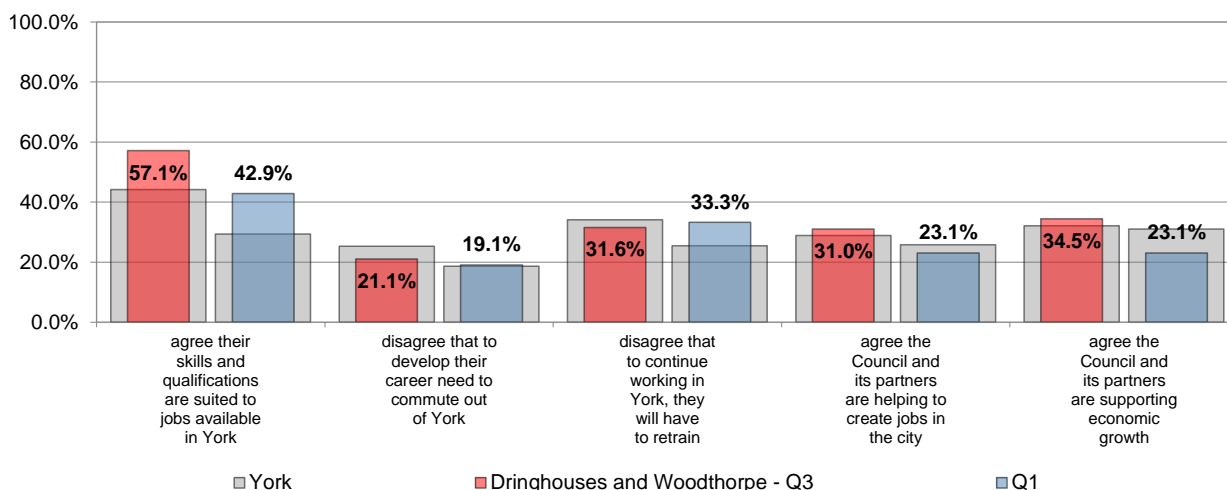
Due to variations in broadband performance over time, Ofcom cautions that the data should not be regarded as a definitive but rather a snapshot of current variation in availability across the country.

The coverage of gigabit-capable broadband networks – which includes hybrid fibre coaxial (HFC) cable in addition to full fibre – has grown to reach 86% or 25.9 million residential premises in the UK by January 2025. Based on this interim update, the Government's target of 85% coverage by 2025 is on track to be met.

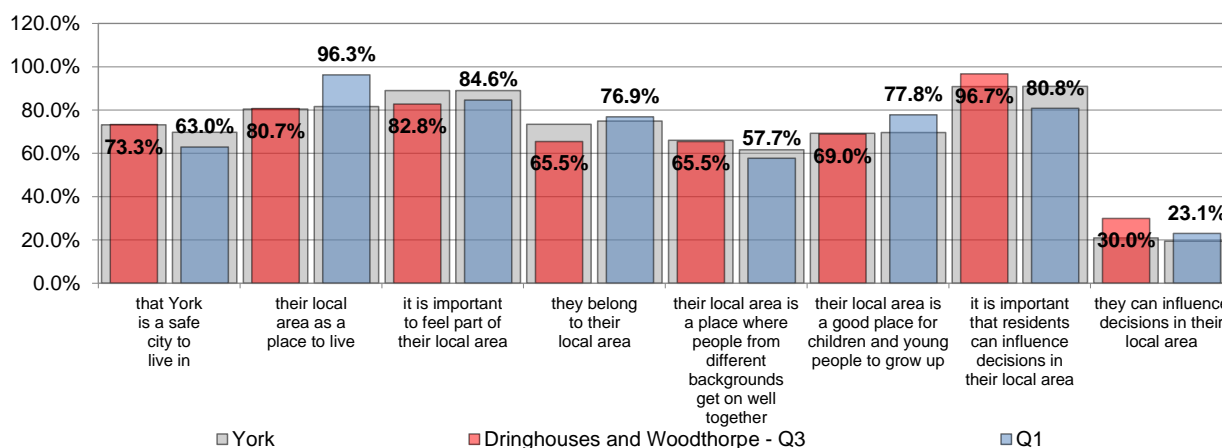

Respondents were asked to consider their Local Area as the area within 15-20 minutes walking distance from their home



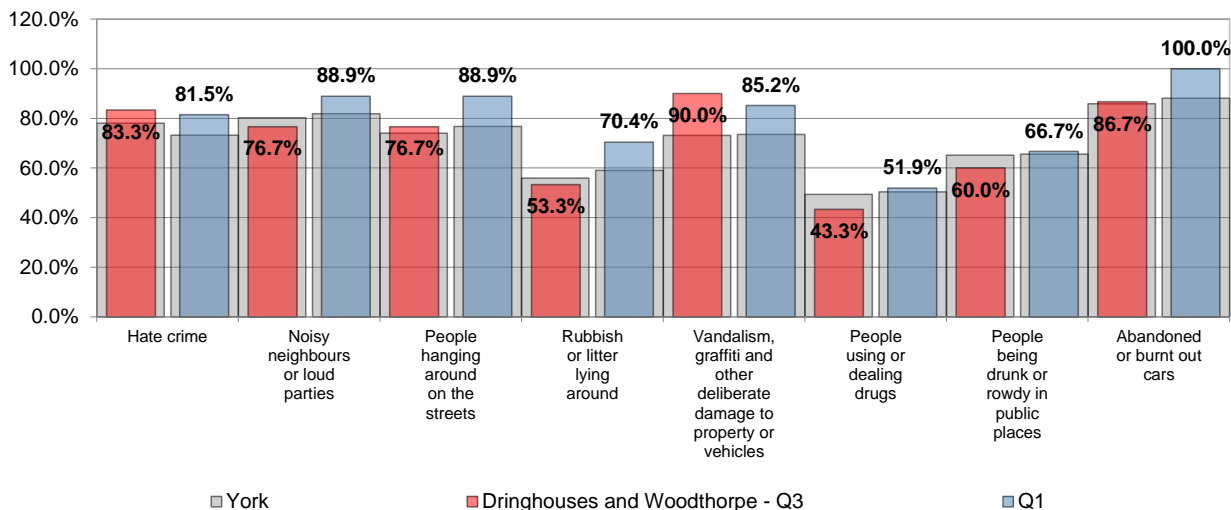

Resident satisfaction responses about Public Realm in their Local Area

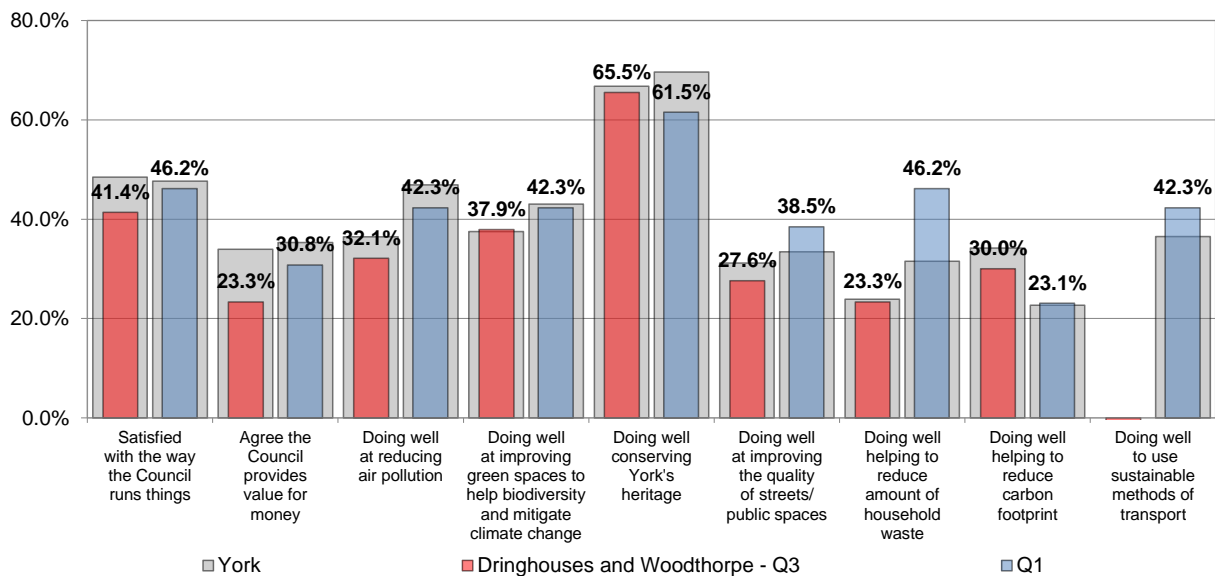

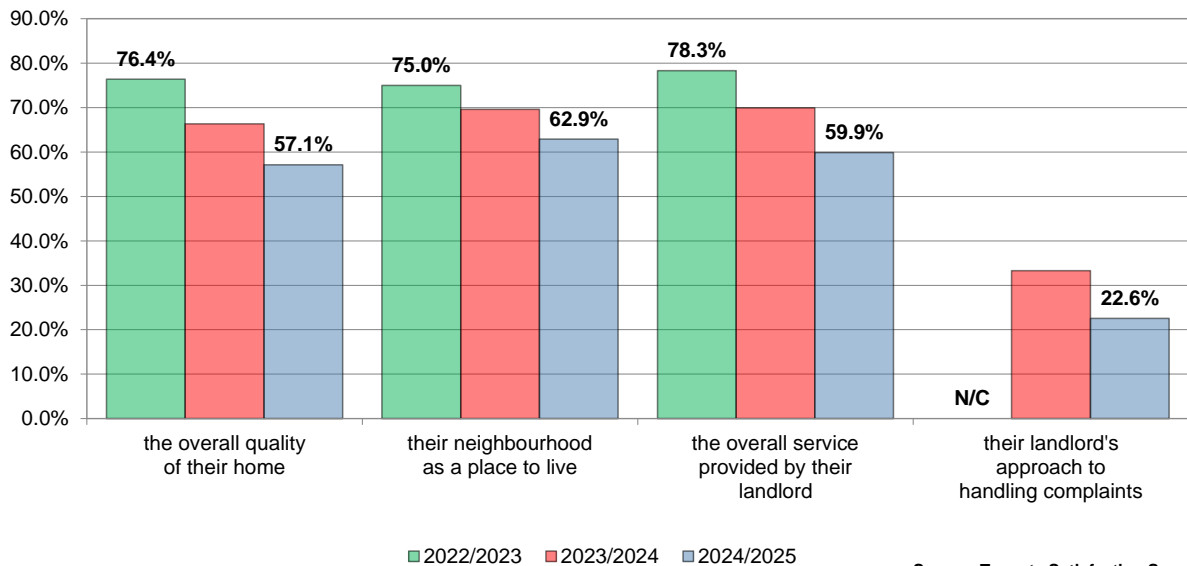
Resident satisfaction responses about the Council (and partners)
